TRACY MOREAU'S SPOT

Painting Tip:

Tired of having the Paint bleed under your tape??

Try applying a very thin coat of Matt Medium, all-purpose sealer. or DecoArts Decoupage Matt over the edge of your tape before applying your color. Let it dry thoroughly before applying your color.

When removing the tape, fold it back on itself and pull it along at a 45-degree angle. Take your time...if you do this while the paint is still wet, you will lower the risk of "tearing" the fresh paint, and it will leave you with a clean edge.

tip: to avoid bleeding....

Use a high-quality Painters' tape, not MASKING TAPE.

Frog tape, or 3M Safe Release tape, are the two I recommend.

Both of these use a moisture-activated adhesive that greatly reduces the chance of paint bleeding.

Store your tape in a sandwich container or the container it is sold in (Frog Tape). This prevents detritus (dust, glitter, etc.) from adhering to the edges of the tape (causing a rough edge)

Painting Tip:

I have a stack of MUST have tools for designing.... I like my circles to be circles; I like my straight lines to be straight...It's virtually impossible to free hand them that way. So, I use tools. I use templates for small squares, circles, triangles, etc. I use rulers and t squares to ensure lines are straight, I use a lettering rule, to ensure that spacing is correct, Mechanical Pencils, ultra fine

point gel and felt tip pens, and my light tablet... they are all important in my own process and each designer has their own, have no doubt. Here are just a couple of great tools that are handy for any painter!

Geometry kit: I know you had one in school; I keep one in my stash. Perfect for classes and travelling, it has nearly everything you could need! toss in an eraser and an extra pencil and your set!

Staedtler General Purpose Templates. For making circles, squares, triangles of all sizes. They help keep shape and size consistent (handy for tracing too.. just match the sizes).

A good Quality STEEL Ruler (Cork Backed). I have a 6" that it ideal for everyday work. Plastic rulers tend to chip giving you an irregular line.

Hit a local staples or office supply store, they are all reasonably priced, and worth the investment. Back to School season is a great time to buy them as most stores have discounts and coupons available.

Painting tip:

There are a variety of ways to make stencils for your own use. You can use the electronic cutting machines (Silhouette, Cricket etc.) Or you can hand cut them from Stencil material (Like the one shown) Or you can cut a limited use stencil from Heavy card stock. You can use large paper punches, even cookie cutters to create simple stencil designs for craft and art projects. You don't have to use commercial stencils to create incredible design work! Trace your chosen design onto heavy card stock, and cut it out using a craft knife or precision cutter.

On stencil material like the one shown ... place the line drawing under a piece of plate glass and position the Mylar over it, then cut it out using a craft knife, precision cutter or a hot knife (similar to a wood burning tool) These simple homemade stencils can help you create work that is YOU-Niquely YOU!

Design Ideas:

Trace fall leaves, pattern in fabric, geometric shapes, sea shells, letters.... anything that you like!! Just keep it simple!!

Did you know.....

Delftware or Delft pottery, also known as Delft Blue or as delf, is a general term now used for Dutch tin-glazed earthenware. Most of it is blue and white pottery, and the city of Delft in the Netherlands was the major center of production, but the term covers wares with other colors, and made elsewhere. It is also used for similar pottery, English delftware.

Delftware is one of the types of tin-glazed pottery or faience in which a white glaze is applied, usually decorated with metal oxides, in particular the cobalt oxide that gives the usual blue, and can withstand high firing temperatures, allowing it to be applied under the glaze.

Delftware forms part of the worldwide family of blue and white pottery, using variations of the plant-based decoration first developed in 14th-century Chinese porcelain, and in great demand in Europe.

Delftware includes pottery objects of all descriptions, such as plates, vases, figurines and other ornamental forms and tiles. The style originated around 1600, and the most highly regarded period of production is about 1640–1740, but Delftware continues to be produced. In the 17th and 18th centuries the manufacture of Delftware was a major industry, with product exported all over Europe

Did you know...

Repoussé or repoussage is a metalworking technique in which a malleable metal is shaped by hammering from the reverse side to create a design in low relief. Chasing or embossing is a similar technique in which the piece is hammered on the front side, sinking the metal. The two techniques are often used in conjunction.

Many metals can be used for chasing and repoussé work, including gold, silver, copper, and alloys such as steel, bronze, and pewter.

These techniques are ancient and have been extensively used all over the world, as they require only the simplest tools and materials, and yet allow great diversity of expression. They are also relatively economical, since there is no loss or waste of metal, which mostly retains its original size and thickness. Toolmarks are often intentionally left visible in the result.

A few among many famous examples of repoussé and chasing are the prehistoric Gundestrup cauldron, the mask on the mummy of Tutankhamun, the body armors of the Bronze Age, the copper ornaments made by the Native Americans in the Southeastern United States, and the Statue of Liberty in New York City.

Did you know...

John Singer Sargent (January 12, 1856 – April 15, 1925) was an American expatriate artist, considered the "leading portrait painter of his generation" for his evocations of Belle Époque and Edwardian-era luxury. He created roughly 900 oil paintings and more than 2,000 watercolors, as well as countless sketches and charcoal drawings.

Sargent's work is characterized by remarkable technical facility, particularly in his ability to draw with a brush, which in later years inspired admiration as well as criticism for its supposed superficiality. His commissioned works were consistent with the grand manner of portraiture, while his informal studies and landscape paintings displayed a familiarity with Impressionism. In later life, Sargent expressed ambivalence about the restrictions of formal portrait work and devoted much of his energy to mural painting and working en plein air. Art historians generally ignored society artists such as Sargent until the late 20th century
